

BROOKLYN TWILIGHT FESTIVAL

The first Brooklyn Festival in 14 years happened on Saturday 11 November. This happened in partnership between Brooklyn Community Centre, Two Todman, and Vogelmorn Community Group. Over 5,000 people attended, both from the local neighbourhood and wider-Wellington.

The festival began at 3pm. Walking in the Harrison Street entrance, festival-goers were met by 20 community stalls including the Brooklyn Residents Association, Brooklyn Kindergarten, Capital Montessori, and many more. Further down Harrison Street were a collection of



food stalls selling everything from tacos to burgers, and potato tornadoes.

At 3.30pm, the main-stage kicked off with a beautiful performance from Ridgway School Kapa haka. Anika Moa followed, inviting 30 children to join her



on stage. Then Fun & Funner! closed out the family entertainment before Casual Healing, Milk Tooth, Ingrid & The Ministers, and Newtown Rocksteady finished the night at 10.30pm.

The Community Stage featured over 40 local performers including a guitar group



from Toi Taniwha Music Academy, a belly dancer, and circus acts from the Wellington Circus School. Meanwhile, inside Brooklyn Community Centre, 20 market stalls sold a wide variety of arts and crafts for Christmas shopping.

Alongside the festival, many Brooklyn businesses reported a boom in business from the day as people stayed for afterfestival drinks and food.

The festival was an enormous success and plans are already under-way for 2024. This would not have been possible without the generous support



of Wellington City Council, the Vogelmorn Foundation, Brooklyn Resource Centre Trust, Pub Charity, and New Zealand Community Trust.

ANOTHER WINNING MURAL FOR BROOKLYN

Brooklyn has had some vibrant colour added to it recently with the installation of a stunning mural on Ohiro Road by hobby artist Kiran Parbhu. Kiran grew up in Owhiro Bay, moved to Palmerston North to study aviation at Massey, and returned in 2017 to begin work at Air New Zealand as a pilot on the Regional Turboprop Fleet. Kiran has always enjoyed art, particularly drawing. A few years ago, he entered the Keep New Zealand Beautiful Nature Murals competition where entrants find a suitable local wall, create a nature-themed design, and submit it. Ten winners are picked around the country and are given sponsorship from Resene for the materials, as well as a commission from Keep New Zealand Beautiful to bring

the concept to fruition. Kiran was one of the winners and the result was the mural outside the power station at the bottom of Brooklyn Hill. That was Kiran's first time doing large scale painting, which he says he found quite intimidating.

The latest mural was another winning design of Kiran's for the Keep New Zealand Beautiful competition. This time Kiran chose to try something a bit different and not just depict birds. He decided to highlight creatures that pollinate our plants as they are an important and varied aspect of our ecosystem that can be easily overlooked. There are several types of insects and a gecko, as well as a Bellbird (he says he couldn't help himself with the birds), all of which can be found locally. Alongside these there are a number of native flowering plants, which Kiran hopes will give people inspiration as to what they can add to their own gardens to help create an abundant food source for these pollinators.

Kiran says while he was painting the mural he had many locals stop and chat. One woman told him it was much better than the one down the hill with the "ghastly" pastels. Kiran didn't get a chance to tell her he had painted that one as well but says, "Thank you chatty stranger, I'm glad to know that I'm doing better now!" Kiran also mentions, "To a degree I think Brooklyn residents must be easy to please. After I had finished cleaning the wall, before I started painting, a passer-by told me it looked good. I hadn't even started yet!"

Kiran has a message to everyone who engaged with him during his painting: "Ngā mihi nui ki a koutou for all the

Amazingly, the end-of-the-year is upon us, with its get-togethers and celebrations. Even more amazingly, this year FOOS is celebrating 20 years of existence. Sometimes it seems hard to see what we have been doing, but then we remember, particularly at the site just past Jamieson's Towing, how bare and open it was there; and how the Brooklyn Scouts struggled to plant little coprosmas in the hard, stony ground. Now, these are an established forest, eight metes tall and interspersed with other species. So, we intend to give ourselves a little pat on the back with a special end of year celebration in December, where we will look back on what we have achieved.

As I understand it, in 2003 Brooklyn Community Association member Gwen Devereux called a meeting to bring to the community's attention the appalling state of the Owhiro Stream, which was regarded a little more than a drain, and organised a working bee to remove rubbish. From this meeting, a committee was established which included Paul Blaschke, George Holley, and later, Martin Payne, with input from Greater Wellington and the City Councils. Sadly, the stream still attracts a lot of rubbish; we hope nowadays not so much fly-tipping, but still many wind-blown plastic bags etc. The denser planting along the west bank of the stream is intended not only to shade and protect the steam banks and fish life, but also to catch this rubbish and deter random rubbish dumping.

Like plants, some things survive and thrive, other ideas wither and die. In 2007 my minutes note that we would hold regular working bees on the second Saturday of the month, and that we needed an attractive and regularly updated webpage. Well, the working bees have survived, but we are still looking for a reliable webmaster! Another successful survivor is the shade house, started by George Holley at the Resource Centre and now housed at Vennell Street, with a sophisticated watering system and recently, smart new weed mat.

FESTIVALS IN BROOKLYN

The festival Brooklyn enjoyed in early November was a resounding success, echoing the huge street festival we saw in Brooklyn a number of years ago. However, festivals in our area are by no means new.

On 21 December 1870 the Combined Friendly Societies held their annual fete on the Goathurst Estate (Brooklyn). The Evening Post provided excellent coverage of the event:

The sight of flagpoles and booths on the heights of Goathurst Farm was a signal for pleasure seekers in the morning to get ready. After breakfast hour many began to storm the hill at their leisure and before the heat of the sun came to boiling point. At about 10am the Societies gathered in strength at the Oddfellows Hall, with their band and regalia, and rode in cabs toward the venue. The cabs could not be prevailed upon to face the Ohiro hill, so all passengers had to get out in front of the Mayor's residence and face the heat and the hill. By the time they arrived there was already a large assembly of people on the farm. The ground was bare, dry, and hot but the view over the harbour and town was magnificent.

The spirited caterers, both for those of a bacchanalian turn, and the more discreet followers of Father Matthew, were well represented and provided for. The sports committee set up the many games in the programme, and private enterprise provided swing boats, Aunt Sally, and a miniature representation of the Paris balloon.

The Garrison Band had the protection of a roof from the scorching sun, and were not allowed to idle their time. There was a constant demand for dance music by lads and lasses in the hey-day of youth and spirits. In the intervals of the music the time-honoured kissin-the--ring circles received large reinforcements, and it was a pretty display of colonial cheek.

The day ended with much mirth, and with the people singing all the way down the hill.

Sporting activities and activities at the fete included archery; quoits; boys' and girls' races; jingling; hoop races; wheelbarrow races; single sticks; sack races; pig hunting; swing boat; children's swings; and "The Great New Derby Game".

In November 1997 the Brooklyn Community Association (Brooklyn Community Centre) held the first of what was to become an annual street festival in Cleveland Street. The festival ran until 2009 when increased costs and compliance resulted in the festival no longer being financially viable.

Second article discussing possible causes and remedies of the current anxiety and depression epidemic.

Disconnection from other people causing loneliness...

Humans started off in the savannahs of Africa living in tribes and being only able to survive because they collaborated in a group. The moment you were separated from your group you were very vulnerable and in mortal danger. Studies (John Cacioppo et al) have shown that our bodies are still wired that way. If someone feels acutely lonely, the stress hormone production increases as high as if they were being physically attacked. This is an urgent signal from your body and brain to quickly "get back to your group". Every human instinct is honed not for life on your own, but for life in a tribe. We don't only feel bad in isolation, but also insecure. Lonely people notice threats much faster than socially connected people. In this hypervigilant state you become more suspicious of any social contact, take offence where none was intended, and can become afraid of strangers. You start to be afraid of the very thing you need most, as disconnection spirals into more disconnection. The tragedy is that many depressed people receive less love, as they become harder to be around.

For decades Harvard professor Robert Putnam has been documenting one of the most important trends of our time: that we do less and less together in groups. Involvement in community organisations dropped by 45% from 1985 to 1994. The structures for looking out for each other in families and communities fell apart. We disbanded our tribes and often



unconsciously experimented to see if humans could live alone. We changed or were forced to adopt an individualistic vision of how to live: shut yourself in your home, accumulate success and stuff for yourself. We have shrunk our sense of self to just our ego, and this has made our pain swell and our happiness shrivel.

Many people feel lonely, isolated, and meaningless even though they see people every day. To ease loneliness, we need to have a sense of mutual aid, meaningful connection, and protection. We must return to seeing our distress and our joy as something we share in community and create social reconnection again.

Christmas and summer holidays are approaching fast. Let us all consciously build community with family and friends and reach out to each other to deepen our relationships. Make the supreme effort to find your tribe - walk, talk, eat, and share life together. By Konstanze A


We'd like to introduce our new office cat, Cairo!
