AGM

The Brooklyn Community Association (BCA), which owns and manages the Brooklyn Community Centre, held its Annual General Meeting on Sunday 21 September. Brooklyn Road / Brooklyn connections

Wellington City Council has indicated that in early 2026 they intend to resurface Brooklyn Road/Ohiro Road to the village or thereabouts. As part of the process WCC intends to implement some parts of the Brooklyn Connections project. The installation of permanent raised concrete barriers along the south bound bike lane on Brooklyn Road is to go ahead. However, there will be no in-lane bus stops, no speed bumps, and no raised pedestrian crossings on Brooklyn Road or down to Aro Street. While the GBRAI have advocated against the speed bumps, pedestrian island changes, and the location of some of the in-lane bus stops, it is budgetary constraints that have actually succeeded in stopping these elements of the plan. WCC plan to continue with the cycle lane on Ohiro Road heading north to finish at the intersection of Tanera Cres/Ohiro Road just at the bus stop. All the car parks there will be lost. GBRAI has tried to discuss with WCC alternative plans but has not been listened to. As we find out/have information we will keep you updated.

Mayoral, Southern Ward, Maori (Te Whanganui a tara) and GWRC Elections

When you read this article, the Local Body Election candidates' meetings will be over, and voting will be concluding for council (s) on Saturday 11 October. We hope you had a chance to attend one or both of our candidate meetings and this helped you to make an informed voting decision.

Battery recycling & diverting them from ending in the landfill

In October 2022 GBRAI initiated a local battery collection project for our community. To mid-September 2025, GBRAI have collected and recycled: 467kg of all various battery types The most numerous are: 1) 240kg of AA batteries; 2) 70kg of AAA batteries; 3) 28kg of C batteries; 4) 36kg of D batteries and in excess of 91kg of assorted 6V, 9V, 12V, 18V and computer batteries. This is in conjunction with the very successful Brooklyn Community Centre plastic and metal bottle top and tetrapak/liquid paperboard container recycling scheme.

HOUSE ON THE MOVE



Brooklyn Library has started a book talk on the first Friday of each month, at 2pm. Come along and hear about books others have read and share some of your own recent reads.

Lately we've been reading New Zealand authors. Here's what we've enjoyed:

Harbouring by Jenny Pattrick is the story of the settlers who came to New Zealand as part of the New Zealand Company, and their arrival in Wellington. It's focused on Huw, a labourer from a hard-hit area of Wales, and his family. It delves into the reasons they leave Wales, and the hardships faced when establishing their new lives.

The Paradise Generation by Sanna Thompson (winner of the Young Adult Fiction Award for the 2025 New Zealand Book Awards for Children & Young Adults) is a future focused story also set in Wellington. It illustrates an alarming future, covering topics such as sea levels rising, gene selection, and autonomy, but remains




hopeful with the strength of rangatahi challenging the norms.

1985 by Dominic Hoey is an Auckland based novel, set mostly in 1980s Glen Eden. The story focuses on Obi, a youngster on the cusp of his teenage years, coming of age in the era of space invaders, the rainbow warrior bombing, a dysfunctional family, his mum's sickness and his dad's grand schemes.

DIRT (Disaster Innovation Research and Teaching) is your local community resilience group. For over a year we've been meeting monthly at Vogelmorn (93 Mornington Road) to help our neighbourhood get better prepared for earthquakes, extreme weather and other disruptive events.

At our September event we had Paige Koedijk with their project The Peninsula - visual storytelling about ordinary members from the Miramar Peninsula community in tongue-in-cheek survival situations during an ongoing zombie catastrophe. Yes, time to talk zombies!!

At a serious level, Paige's work emphasises the critical role of resilient communities in mitigating the impacts of climate-accelerated disasters, which disproportionately affect vulnerable populations. The use of humour and the spectacle of a zombie context is an

engaging narrative experience for people to consider their contributions relative to the community in an emergency.

While it can be hard to think about disasters and disruptive events the evidence is clear - we are much better off getting together to connect, learn and act now.

his medicine if it's hidden in his food. He's eligible for our Care for Life permanent foster programme.



Developed in the 1970s by Dr. Arthur Lincoln Pauls—a British osteopath and judo instructor—this modality blends principles of osteopathy with the intuitive understanding of movement and comfort found in martial arts. The term itself is derived from Greek roots: ortho meaning correct, bio meaning life, and nomy meaning the laws or principles—together signifying "the correct application of the laws of life".

Unlike traditional manipulative therapies, Ortho-Bionomy does not rely on forceful adjustments or deep pressure. Instead, practitioners use subtle positioning, gentle compression, and light touch to engage the body's proprioceptive and autonomic nervous systems. These techniques help the body recognize areas of tension or imbalance and initiate its own corrective responses. This approach often leads to profound shifts—not just physically, but emotionally and energetically—as the body releases long-held patterns of stress and dysfunction.

Sessions typically involve the client lying fully clothed on a massage table while the practitioner guides the body into positions of ease and comfort. These positions are held briefly, allowing the nervous system to register safety and relaxation. The result is often a spontaneous release of tension, improved alignment, and a greater sense of well-being. Clients frequently report increased range of

motion, reduced pain, enhanced postural awareness, and a deep sense of relaxation following treatment.

Ortho-Bionomy is particularly effective for chronic pain, injuries, postural imbalances, and stress-related conditions. It's also a valuable tool for those seeking a more mindful and participatory approach to healing. Many practitioners incorporate selfcare exercises—such as gentle movements and awareness practices—so clients can continue the healing process between sessions.

At its core, Ortho-Bionomy honors the intelligence of the body. It invites change not through force, but through recognition, comfort, and cooperation. In a world often dominated by "fix-it" approaches, this modality offers a refreshing reminder: sometimes, the most powerful healing begins with listening.

ENGINEERING FAMILIES IN BROOKLYN

Brooklyn has been blessed with a number of families all prominent in the engineering field over the last one hundred plus years. In the 1870s, Charles Seagar and his son Edward emigrated to Wellington, and built a large homestead at 145 Ohiro Road. Above the house, on the hill overlooking the house and commanding a sweeping view of Wellington and its harbour, St Anthony's Church School was built. This hill ultimately became known as Seagar's Hill, as the Seagar family not only owned the large residence below, they also owned a large tract of land surrounding it.

At the same time, the corner of Ohiro Road, and what became known as Brooklyn Road, was known as Seagar's Corner.

After Edward died, the house was bought by another engineering family, the Crabtrees. William Crabtree had four sons with three, Thomas, William and James, being engineers, and Louis, who was a joiner. The Crabtrees were iron and brass founders in Eva Street in the city. The firm had been established in 1878 by William. A 10hp horizontal steam engine drove the plant. The Crabtrees were related to the Cable family where William had begun his engineering business along the Hutt Road. William Cable was in fact apprenticed to William Crabtree and eventually became a senior partner with Crabtree, before setting up his own business empire.

William Crabtree had only one daughter, Alice, and all were still living in the Ohiro Road house in the mid 1940s. Alice outlived all her brothers and died in the house in 1949.


Prior to buying the Ohiro Road property, the family lived at 46 Hopper Street.



UPDATE



Right now, we're being treated to sprays of rangiora's delicate creamy white flowers. Why would you want to cut them down?

That's a question Wellington City Council (WCC) and Upstream have been asking after several incidents of tree and shrub vandalism in Central Park. WCC have been treating the trees to minimise the long-term damage. It's sad that someone would want to hurt the trees that way.

Meanwhile the park is putting on its spring show. Magnolias, rhododendron and clivia are flowering alongside our more modest endemic specifies, like rangiora. Rangiora has several names, answering to Brachyglottis repanda in botany terms, but also puka puka and bushman's friend (or toilet paper). These names indicate the uses of the large leaves, green on top, white beneath with white hairs. According to Ngā Rauropi Whakaoranga, written accounts of settlers said Māori used the leaves to wrap food for cooking and used the sap for wounds. Settlers themselves found other purposes for the leaves, using them in bush ablutions. The New Zealand Plant Conservation Network note that rangiora leaves are stiff enough to carry a message written in ballpoint pen. One of the Māori names, puka puka, alludes to the similarity of rangiora and the leaves of a book.

So many uses, not to mention creating the air that we breathe.


